- Beautify Clintonville Parks


HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

- Your group, business or organization will work with the Director of Public Works in determining which park will benefit most from your efforts and will be most convenient for your volunteers. Maintenance efforts will be tailored to your adopted park and may include:
 - Litter Pick-Up/Graffiti Removal
 - Small-Scale Gardening and Landscaping
 - Sweeping Walkways
 - Tree Planting and Stewardship
 - Painting
 - Miscellaneous Small-Scale projects
